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☼ Read who you think are the best writers in your area

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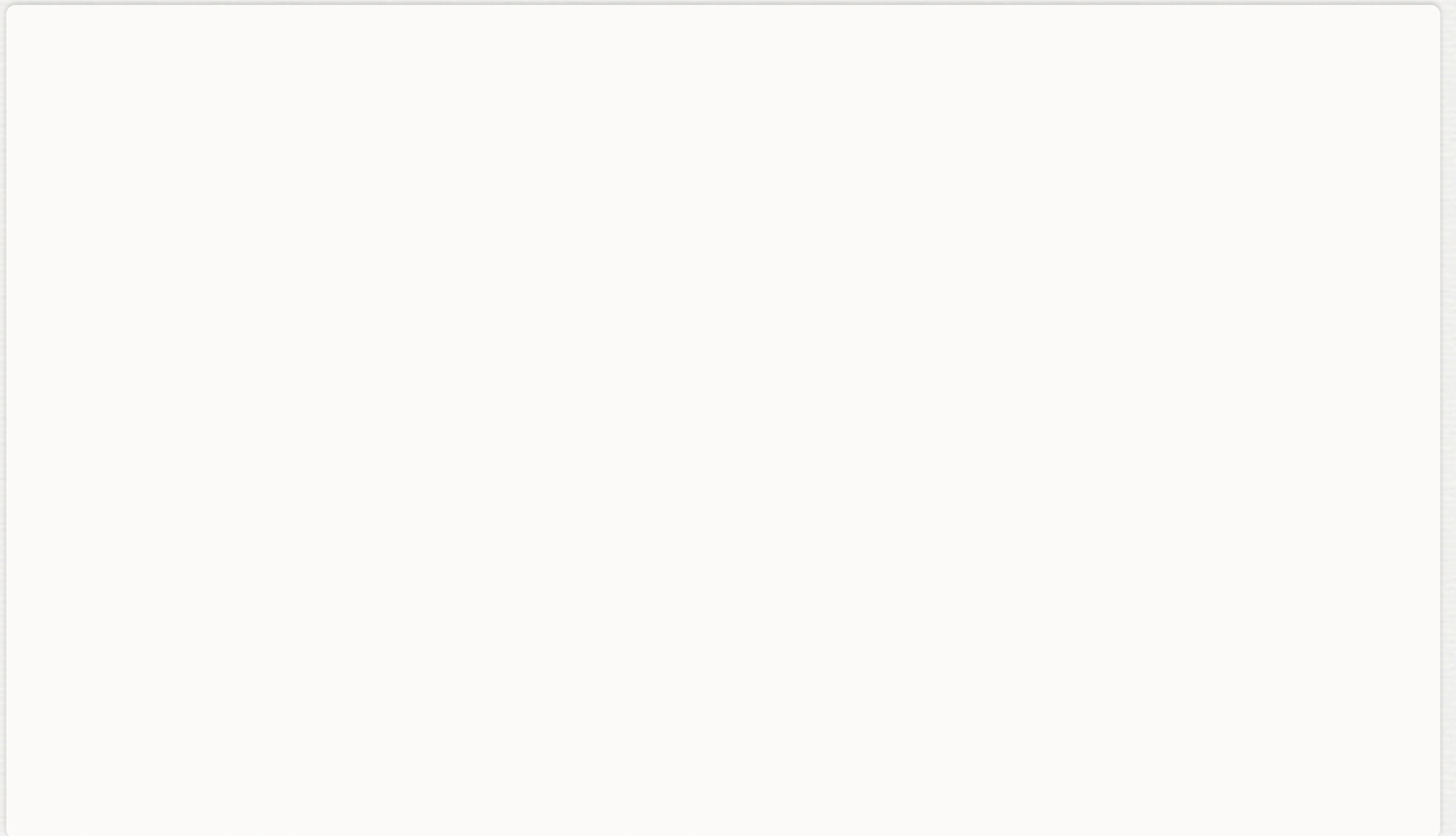
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 - ✻ Read who you think are the best writers in your area

LIT REVIEW METHODS



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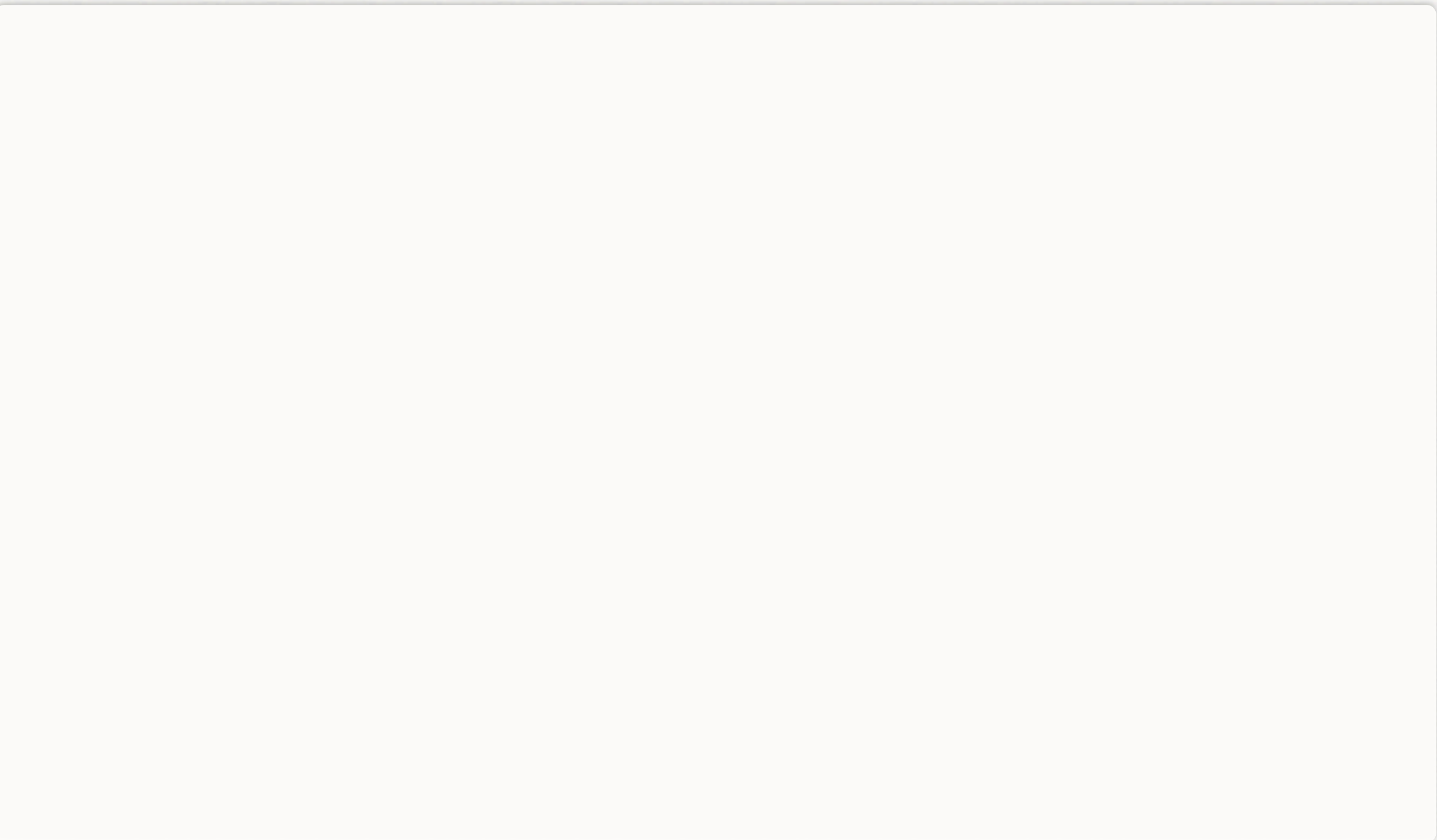

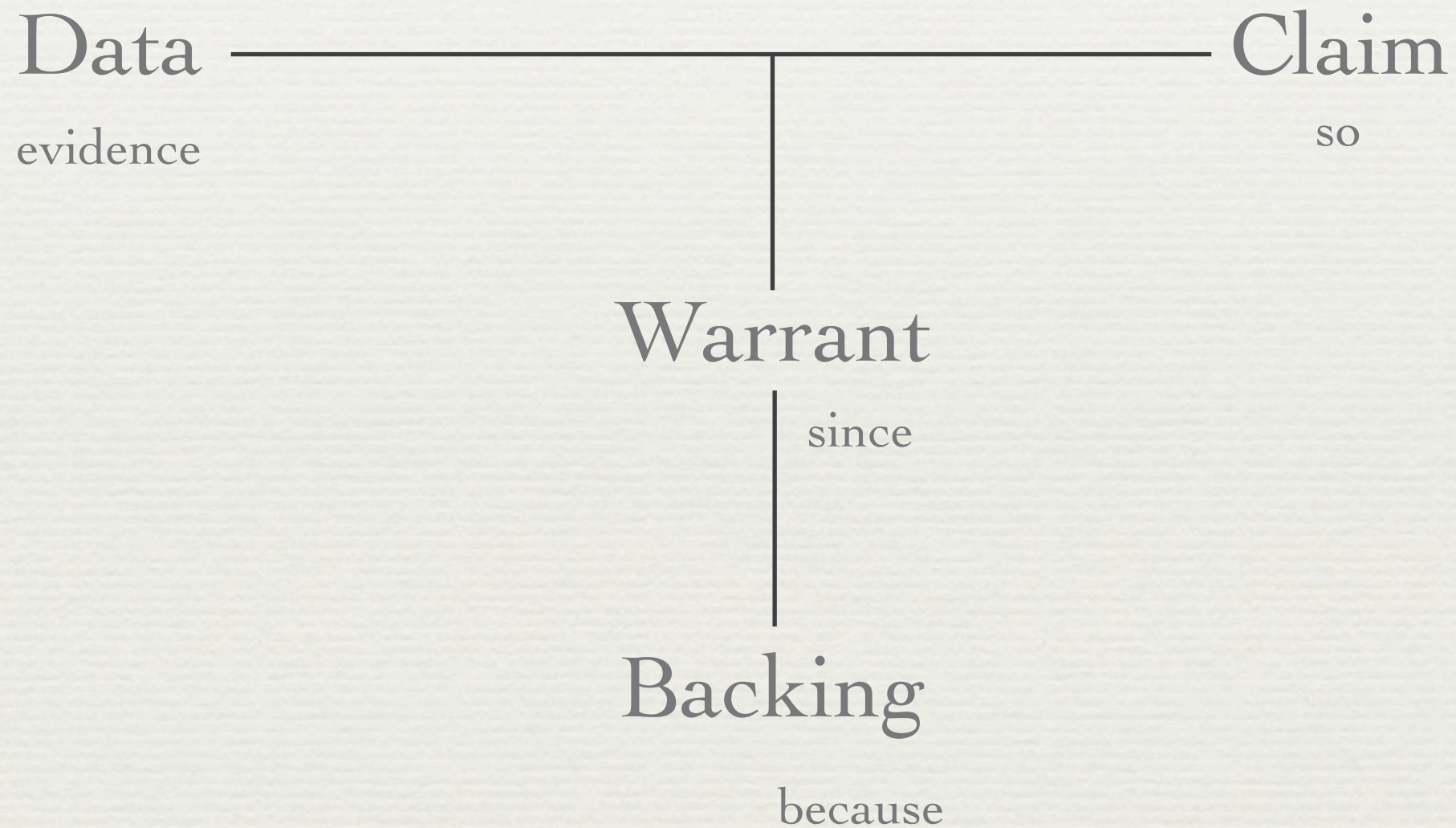

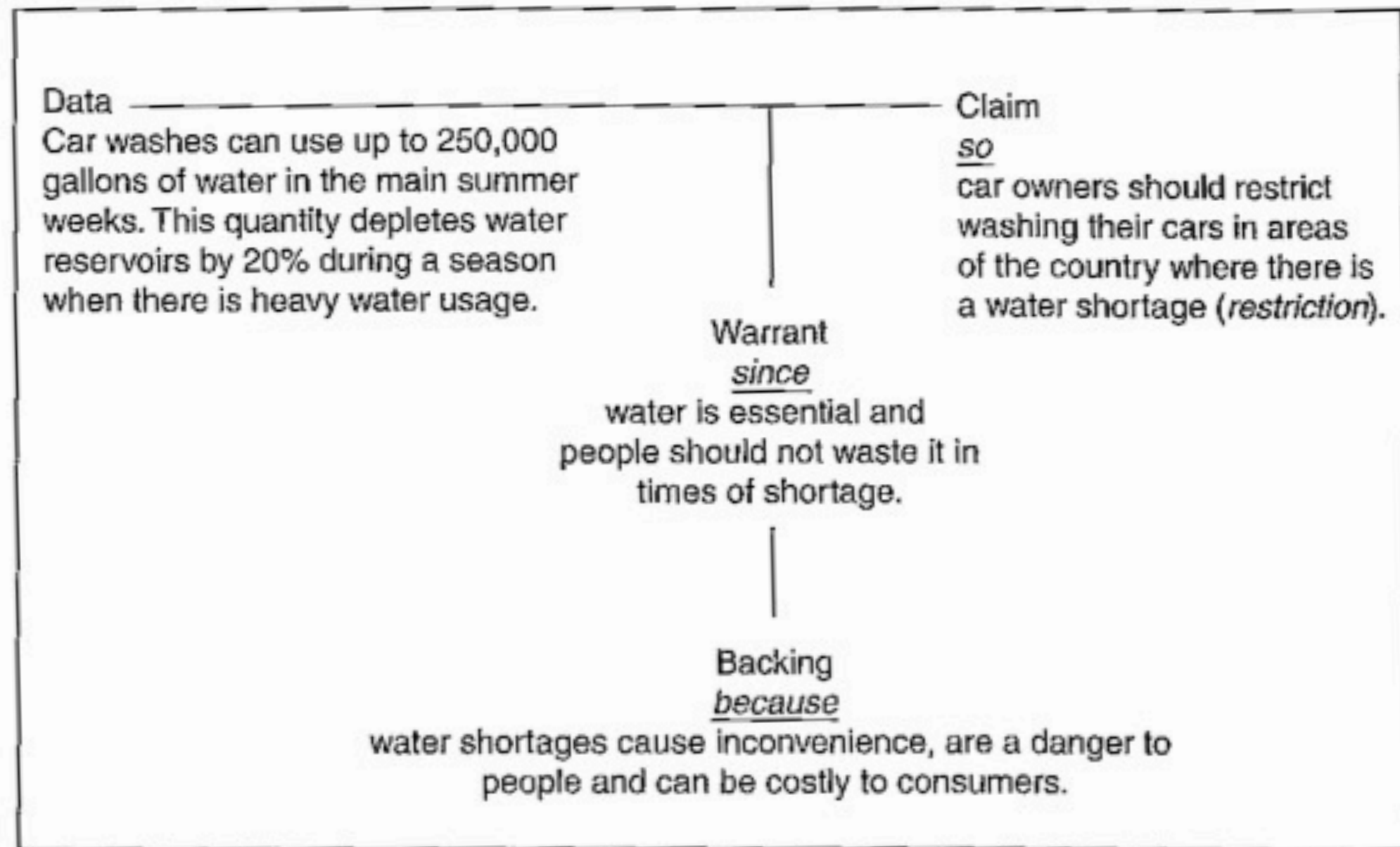


Figure 4.2 An argument for saving water
